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### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

Hello, Members and Friends, on a beautiful sunny September Saturday as I try to concentrate on writing a few lines for the October newsletter between watching football games, shopping at the Montgomery Village farmers' market, and reading the bad news in the Washington Post--oh, yes, and also working on implementing ideas from a fabulous book, "Kick the Clutter," that I picked up while helping at a pre-sort for our spring book sale. As you know, clearing clutter is a challenging and painful process when one has lived in their home for 45 years. The author of the book is realistic and gentle, sayng, "Clear out excess stuff without losing what you love."

So where do I begin? First of all, our September Branch meeting was the beginning of what I envision as a great final year of my presidency. As usual, Liz Clark Hessel moderated a panel of six very impressive scholarship recipients from Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove. These articulate young women spoke of their accomplishments and goals for the future, all showing appreciation for the help they have been given by our Branch through scholarship assistance. Two are majoring in cybersecurity, one in management of construction, one in computer science, one in math, and one in aerospace engineering. As you know, our goal has been to support women students majoring in underrepresented fields. We were glad to have Francine Walker, Montgomery College's director of gifts and planned giving, in attendance. Following the meeting, I presented a red rose to panel members, as well as to Francine. In addition, I made sure she had a copy of the AAUW up-to-date publication, "Women in Community Colleges—Access to Success," along with our publication about becoming a college and university partner. If any of you have not seen this publication, I have extra copies and highly recommend you read it. It was made possible by contributions from The Mooneen Lecce Giving Circle and The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund, which supported the research initiative behind the report. We had 22 members and quests in attendance in addition to the the panel members, and all of us enjoyed the delicious refreshments provided by Jean Hirsch and her hospitality committee. Two of the quests decided to join the Branch after attending the September meeting.

During our business meeting, I was happy to have our 2014-15 budget, as presented by Treas-



urer Terry Medlar, adopted, and also to have adopted the further allocation of scholarship funds. I pointed out the new program brochures (apple green this year) as produced again by our member Edie Allison and urged members to show them to friends who might be prospective members.

As you have heard, Congress again failed to vote on some of the legislation we have been lobbying on for so long that would benefit women but instead have gone on a twomonth vacation to campaign to retain their jobs. Considering the turmoil in which we find many parts of the world, I guess we need to be grateful we have relatively peaceful lives with no bombs bursting around us and to be able to speak our minds and worship as we wish.

As some of you may know, long-time member Jean Eden is now recuperating at Wilson Health Care after being hospitalized for respiratory problems. Please keep her in your thoughts and prayers so that she will soon return to good health.

### SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS TELL THEIR STORIES

I wanted to hand out kleenex. The young women's gratitude brimmed their eyes with tears. From poverty, from homelessness, from parental rejection, from sexual discrimination they told their stories. Way back, they came from Tanzania, Lebanon, Argentina, of course from the U.S. too, and now they will nourish our communities.

At the September Branch meeting, Liz Hessel, chair of book sales and the coordinator of the scholarship distributions that come from book sales, introduced the six Montgomery College and Universities of Shady Grove students who received scholarships from our Branch book sales.

Maryam Mwinyi received a grant to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders held at the University of Maryland in June. She said she learned some helpful leadership skills at the conference. Already on her way as a leader, she is the president of the International Club and treasurer of the Student Center at Montgomery College. She is majoring in cybersecurity and later hopes to transfer to information technology. She hopes one day to pay back some benefit of her education to her original country of Tanzania.

Stacy Curry, on the other hand, is a life-long Montgomery County resident. She is a senior at the Universities of Shady Grove, also majoring in cybersecurity. She currently has an internship at NIST in the cybersecurity branch. Someday she would like to start an online program to help people learn coding skills. Gricel Munoz is originally from Argentina. She is working toward an associate degree in construction management and has a job with a construction company. She



received a Construction Trades Foundation Scholarship when she was at Thomas Edison High School of Technology. She hopes eventually to return to Argentina, start a nonprofit organization for international students and begin a trade program to design and build a home.

Megan Nugent is majoring in computer science. She hopes eventually to get degrees in computer science and linguistics.

Nirja Kwtan Dave is of eastern Indian descent. A math major, she is interested in eventually getting into international relations and starting a nonprofit organization focused on education and literacy.

Anissa Dib is studying aerospace engineering. Her goal is to work in the petroleum engineering field and, also, to start a nonprofit organization to promote education. She is originally from Lebanon.

For AAUW members who hauled heavy boxes, sorted mountains of books and toiled long hours at the book sale, hearing from these students showcased the fruit of their labors.

**AAUW FUNDS UPDATE** - Heather Reichardt, Funds Chair

At the September 16 Branch meeting the membership approved the Board of Directors' recommendation to make a total contribution of \$8,000 to national's AAUW Funds for scholarships and legal support. These funds resulted from sales of books by our membership and follow the \$11,500 previously allocated to scholarship recipients at the Universities at Shady Grove and Montgomery College. The following is a description of what the AAUW Funds cover.

We are giving \$1,000 to American Fellowships. This fund supports women scholars who are completing dissertations, planning research leave from accredited institutions, or who are preparing research for publication.

We are giving \$2,500 to Selected Professions Fellowships. These fellowships are awarded to women who intend to pursue a full-time course of study at accredited U.S. institutions in an area where women's participation traditionally has been low. They are awarded for these master's programs: architecture, engineering, computer and information sciences, and mathematone wants to join me"; "On Monday we had a good group sorting. ment Grants. These grants provide funds to women who have a bachelor's degree and who are preparing to advance or change careers or


re-enter the workforce. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields.
