ANNABEL G. LIEBELT 1926-2012

Annabel Liebelt passed away on September 12 in Durham, North Carolina. She had been a member of AAUW Gaithersburg in the past, and we remember her fondly and with high regard for her life achievements.

She earned a bachelor of arts degree from Western Maryland College, then a Ph.D. in microscopic anatomy from Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas. She followed with a distinguished academic career in the field of animal cancer research, being recognized as an outstanding teacher and being instrumental in developing the microscopic anatomy teaching program at the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, and finishing her career as an expert and guest researcher at the Registry of Experimental Cancers at the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health. She contributed over 70 scientific papers and book chapters to the field of animal cancer research.

Annabel contributed her talents to many community organizations in addition to AAUW. She was involved with the Asbury Methodist Village School of Continuing Education, Gaithersburg Presbyterian Church, Western Maryland College, and the National Active and Retired Federal Employees Association (NARFE). In 2005 she was inducted into the Maryland Senior Citizens Hall of Fame for her outstanding voluntary services.
