WOMEN IN STEM: ARE WE THERE YET?

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) is certainly gaining momentum today as we strive to prepare students to become the future wokforce in areas that are experiencing both growth and promising job creation. Having been selected by the National Science Foundation to conduct a study on the underrepresentation of women in STEM, AAUW has been, since its inception in 1881, at the forefront of the effort to get more women and girls involved in STEM. The commitment of empowering girls to be informed, engaged and trained in the STEM fields is improving, but there is still much to be done.

The January Branch meeting will entertain a lively discussion of women in STEM and where we stand now. A panelist of women from various backgrounds, such as engineering and science, have have been invited to share their experiences. They will do brief overviews of their careers in the STEM fields followed by questions and answers. Sonya Kovalevsky Day 2014

On Saturday November 15, the Math Department of Montgomery College hosted 56 middle school girls for Sonya Kovalevsky Day, a one day conference to introduce middle school girls to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). All activities were held in the Science Center on the Rockville Campus.

The conference opened with an inspiring talk by Ms. Jill Hubbard, a current engineer on the Silver Line Project. Ms. Hubbard discussed her background, her job experience, and the challenges of being a woman in a male dominated field.

After the keynote speaker, the girls rotated through several activities: Robotics by Dr. Jan Plane from University of Maryland, Chemistry Experiments by Dr. Rachel Ndonye & Professor Nevart Tahmazian, and DNA Explorations by Dr. Leah Allen. Each of these presenters did an amazing job engaging the girls in the activities. These women were the true stars of the day!

During lunch, a student from University of Maryland held an engaging and interactive discussion on internet safety. She talked about privacy, security and best practices for password protection. Thank you to Katie from Computer Connect for the lively discussion!

The day ended with each group attending a mathematics related activity followed by cake and prizes. Thank you to Dr. Amy Shell-Gellasch, Ms. Sudha Kunhikrishnan, Professor Lisa Vaughnn and Dr. Jan Plane for facilitating these activities.

Each girl received a t-shirt, a bag, and many STEM related gifts as well as a science project to complete at home.
