It is Martin Luther King's birthday holiday today. My mind is filled with memories of my personal history and that of our country on the subject of race relations and the progress made in my lifetime. All of us remember where we were when we heard Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech from the front of the Lincoln Memorial and our personal emotion at the time. AAUW's value statement is: "In principle and in practice, AAUW values and seeks a diverse membership. There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, national origin, disability or class."

We look forward to our February program when we will hear from one of our own members, Margaret Williams, along with three other Montgomery County African American teachers, about what it was like to move from segregated to integrated schools in our county.

We are fortunate to have members willing to present interesting programs for our Branch. The January program presented by our long-time member, Edie Allison, on "The Joys and Pitfalls of a Geology Career," was very well received by our 20 members and 3 guests in attendance. Edie's explanation of the politically charged subject of "fracking" made the process more understandable. Jean Hirsch, hospitality chair, assisted by Patsy Marks, provided delicious refreshments. The new Kuerig coffee maker Jean purchased for our Branch made a great brew. Maria Roberts' publicity brought one visitor and an e-mail inquiry as to whether Edie would help with a mentoring program for young 4-H members learning about careers in science. It was great to see Grace Reichardt in attendance with her mom, Heather, and to hear about her first semester at the University of Montana.

It is good news to learn that the Gaithersburg Library is now open and that we have reservations to have our April and May meetings there. I am looking forward to visiting tomorrow to see the space. Meanwhile, we feel so very fortunate to have had the hospitality offered by Asbury Village in the use of their meeting facilities during the library remodelling.

At our January Board meeting, Liz Clark Hessel told us of her success in selling donated textbooks on the Internet for good prices. It sounded a bit like "day trading" on the Stock Exchange, as some days the price would be much higher than others and she had to "sell" at just the right time. The site Liz uses is bookscouter.com, which lists selling prices for books on about 45 different sites. (Incidentally,



about 45 different sites. (Incidentally, I went into the site with about a half dozen titles of my husband's old textbooks and the most I was quoted for any was \$1.75 and most were for "0" so they are very selective about the types for which there is a market.

We appreciate the patience and time Liz is taking to earn money for scholarships through both the book sale coming up the first week of May and all the pre-sorting involved, as well as the Internet sales and sales to Frederick's Wonder Book. These have netted a steady stream of income for the scholarship fund.

Did you see the interesting article in this week's "Outlook" section of The Washington Post titled "One law isn't enough to ensure fair pay" by Lilly Ledbetter, urging the president and Congress to stop resting on their laurels on passing the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act but urging the president to sign an executive order banning federal contractors from retaliating against workers who ask about wage practices or share salary information and urging Congress to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act. AAUW's study on the subject, as well as our executive director Linda Hallman, was quoted in the article. I am sure that when the Lobby Corps gets back to work this will be a high priority.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the Women's Legislative Briefing next Sunday. It is a "Shape the Future" event where anyone may join AAUW at half the price of the National dues. So I hope we will interest some prospective members.
