Dear Friends,

Happy Women's History Month--a time to focus on women's achievements that have made our lives richer!

What a treat it was to hear Maurine Beasley speak of one such woman of achievement at our March meeting--the activist former First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt. The meeting was well attended, thanks to Maria Roberts' excellent publicity announcements. There were at least four new, or prospectively new, members in attendance. As always, Jean Hirsch and her hospitality committee provided delicious food for our social period, including St. Patrick's Day decorated cookies.

In the absence of Book Sale Chair Liz Clark Hessel at the Branch meeting, I passed out "hot off the press" bright yellow announcements for our upcoming book sale for members to distribute to their centers of influence, as well as sign-up sheets Liz had provided for me to distribute for pre-sorting, various book sale activities, and final week scheduling. It is our hope that as many of our members as are able will find some hours to help with the myriad of tasks needed to make our annual fundraiser for women's scholarships the usual success.

It is with a mixed feeling of nostalgia and relief that I am writing my third to the last message of my tenure as president of the Gaithersburg Branch. There is so much on my mind to share but, again, I take pity on Dorothy Camara, who proofs my writing, and Qing Jiang who prepares it for the publisher (both of whom always do such a great job) and will try not to be too long-winded.

I just read an e-mail from the National Museum for Women in the Arts (NMWA) inviting us to explore their full slate of events, programs and exhibitions in honor of this special month, from concerts and a film festival to a staged reading of new works by women playwrights and gallery talks. It reminds me of the days when we had a cultural arts chairperson (Haydee Rolin) and made trips downtown as a group via Metro to visit this wonderful museum and enjoy docent-led tours. Recently Jean Hirsch told me she took out-of-town visitors to this and other museums and had a most enjoyable day.

No doubt many of you saw with interest the article in the March 17 issue of The Washington Post in the Economy and Business section entitled "Report projects U.S. won't attain gender pay parity until 2058." The first paragraph states: "When it comes to equal pay, the American woman is stuck in the proverbial waiting room. But the number on her ticket--the length of her stay--largely depends on where she lives and to whom she was born." Parity appears closer for East Coast women, with New York

having the narrowest wage gap-87.6 cents for every dollar banked by men. Maryland and D.C. trail slightly, with 87.4 and 87, respectively. Louisiana is last, with 66.7; and West Virginia, 67.3. The report states that across all levels of education, men earn significantly more than women with equal schooling. The wage gap is the largest for those with the most educational attainment. Women with graduate degrees make only 69.1 percent of what men with graduate degrees earn. The study shows a great difference in earnings by race and ethnicity also.

I am not quite sure how this author can be sure women will attain gender pay parity in 2058, but I am sure I will not be around to enjoy this attainment and I am also sure AAUW's Lobby Corps will do all they can to speed up this date!

Our April meeting should be very interesting. We will hear from an immigration attorney about her work representing families and individuals to bring them closer to realizing their American dreams. Invite your friends and neighbors--let's continue our membership growth. Our Branch has done very well this year in membership growth, thanks to the enthusiastic participation of so many of our members.

Kosow will lead the discussion on *Galileo's Daughter: A Historical Memoir of Science, Faith and Love,* by Dava Sobel.

The book was inspired by a long fascination with Galileo, from which, by the remarkable surviving letters of his daughter, Maria Celeste, a cloistered nun, Dava Sobel has crafted a biography that dramatically recolors the personality and accomplishments of a mythic figure whose early 17th century clash with Catholic doctrine continues to define the schism between science and religion--the man Albert Einstein called "the father of

modern physics--indeed of modern science altogether." It is also a stunning portrait of Galileo's daughter, a person hitherto lost to history, described by her father as a "woman of exquisite mind, singular goodness, and most tenderly attached to me."

New members are always welcome. We enjoy light refreshments and fellowship as we discuss the book of the month.
