Featuring Dr. Heidi Hartmann, Feminist Economist

Dr. Heidi Hartmann is founder and president of the Washington-based Institute for Women's Policy Research, an organization created to conduct woman centered public policy research with the goal of strengthening families, communities and societies. IWPR's research data help influence the legislative priorities of numerous advocacy organizations, including AAUW's public policy arm.

Dr. Hartmann also serves as a research professor at George Washington University and is the editor of the Journal of Women, Politics & Policy. She is a graduate of Swarthmore College and earned her Ph.D. degree from Yale University. Before founding IWPR she taught at Yale and the New School for Social Research, later working at the U.S. Commission for Civil Rights, the National Academy of Science and the Census Bureau. She is the author of numerous research papers and books, including the enticingly titled The Unhappy Marriage of Marxism and Feminism. She has been awarded a McArthur Genius Fellowship and honored with several honorary degrees.

The Tuesday, March 21, meeting will be held in the Community Room of the Rosborough Center at Asbury Methodist Village. It will begin with the usual social time, with refreshments, at 7 p.m. followed by Dr. Hartmann's talk at 7:30 p.m.

- Secretary Barbara Garrard



Heather Reichardt, now in her second year as President, is again nominated for that position. She is the director for state and local tax and advisory for the Altus Group U.S.. She has a bachelor's degree in business administration concentrating on real estate and economics from American University, and she has a master's degree in institutional real estate investment from Johns Hopkins University. She lives in Darnestown with her husband, Mark, and two children.

The Book Sale is quickly approaching on April 27 – 29 and many activities are underway to prepare. Last year we received many compliments for the good quality of the books we had and the organization of the books into categories. Both professional book dealers and just regular customers were very appreciative of our efforts.

Each year we sell about half of the books, so we could make more money for scholarships if we can lure more customers to the sale. To that end, we are looking for members to volunteer for a few hours to help advertise and publicize the sale. You can do these jobs at home and report by phone or e-mail. If you have suggestions on who to contact for any of the tasks below, send the names to Liz Hessel at liz@meral.com or 301 840-1258.

The following tasks need to be accomplished. Can you help with some of them?

- Contact local school PTAs to ask them to share information about the sale with their members.
- Contact home school networks to share book sale information. (Our area has many families that home school their children. Generally the families participate with networks of other families.)
- Contact other women's organizations asking them to share information with their members.
- Contact senior citizen organizations and living complexes asking them to share information

with their members. ( Studies show that older people are more frequent book sale customers.)

- Contact organizations whose members read foreign language books (e.g. French, Chinese, Korean, Spanish, German, etc). (Last year we had books in over 15 different languages and most book stores don't carry foreign language books.)
- Seek out organizations with Websites whose members might be interested in books. Ask the organizations to post our book sale information.
- Contact organizations that sponsor book clubs asking them to distribute our book sale information.
- Post our printed flyers on community bulletin boards in your neighborhood.
- Volunteer to help print signs needed for the tables or walls.
- Take our printed flyers to local libraries and ask to post the flyers on their bulletin boards.
- Place printed advertising in newspapers, e.g. Washington Post, Montgomery Village News, etc.
