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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

October, which I normally look forward to as a time of colorful trees and benign weather, has seemed to take on additional strains involving the requirements for Coronavirus-constrained branch activities and a Presidential election that has worried people of every political persuasion. But we have had a successful start to the AAUW year, and Maryland and other states are taking steps to enhance voting accessibility.

We had fifteen participants in our first Zoom branch meeting, and everyone seemed to enjoy group conversations and the presentation by art appraiser Alvah Beander. Our October Zoom program will provide an opportunity to get to know the recipients of our scholarship funding to Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove. This is an inspiring annual program as we meet the next generation of successful women.

While virtual meetings lack the warmth and camaraderie of in-person gatherings, they are still a pleasant way to catch up with friends and acquaintances. Virtual meetings also create greater opportunities to participate in informative and educational meetings, as well as interactive discussions with government or organizational decisionmakers. And there is no driving required. This branch will try to share more virtual programs focusing on women's issues and social inequities illuminated by the pandemic as well as social gatherings or cultural events. I hope you will register for the Montgomery County Board of Education candidate forum on October 5. There is more information later in this newsletter. In addition, expect announcements about programs from our sister branches and AAUW Maryland, which has active public policy, and diversity and inclusion programs.

Women's equity issues have not gotten much attention from the federal government this year and probably will not be on the agenda for the rest of this year as Congress faces elections, the September 30 deadlines for funding the government, and calls for Coronavirus stimulus funding and disaster assistance.

The 2020 Maryland legislative session was perhaps more productive. We can celebrate the passage of several bills important to women for which AAUW Maryland advocated.

 A Maryland salary history ban has been enacted through the efforts of Senator Susan Lee, who had introduced the bill over several years. Maryland AAUW members met with legislators during AAUW MD Advocacy day 2020 and hundreds of members have sent emails in support of the legislation. Preventing a potential employer from requiring a job candidate to provide their salary history assures that women can be paid a salary commensurate with the job rather than past salaries.

- Another bill clarifies strangulation, a type of physical assault often seen in domestic violence and women's murder, as a first-degree felony, strengthening prosecutions.
- Other laws make victims of "date rape" eligible for a protective order, and remove convictions for drug possession and theft if they are the result of the victim's human trafficker.

Next year AAUW and other organizations will work to establish a Maryland family and medical leave insurance program, legislation that did not pass in 2020. The 2021 Session of the Maryland General Assembly will also require our attention lest education and equity for women get lost in the push to deal with huge budget deficits. AAUW Maryland and other state branches will help keep us informed and offer opportunities to get involved.

A Mail-in-Voting Offer for Our Homebound Members

Montgomery County Board of Education Candidate Forum

This branch joins other AAUW branches in the county and the Maryland AAUW in sponsoring the October 5 Montgomery County Board of Education candidate forum. Two candidates will face off for each of three seats on the nine-member Board.

Sunil Dasgupta and Lynne Harris will compete for the at-large seat.

Michael Fryar and Rebecca Somondrowski will compete for the District 2 seat.

Shebra Evans and Steve Solomon will compete for the District 4 seat.

The Board is composed of seven elected members, a student elected by secondary school students and the Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Joshua Starr. The board has two at-large members and a representative for each of five geographic districts. Board members representing all districts are elected by the entire county electorate. [To determine which Education district you are in, see the County Board of Elections maps page.]

The forum provides an opportunity for voters to consider how potential Board members will approach some coming issues. One potentially contentious issue is how to revise school boundaries. Half of county schools are overcrowded while there are empty seats in the other half. In addition, some schools have a

larger proportion of students eligible for free and reduced-price meals compared to the county average. The school board commissioned a countywide analysis of school boundaries.

The Interim Boundary Analysis is available on the school district website. Community discussion of and potential action on the study has been delayed because of the coronavirus health crisis.

Another issue for potential Board members would be how to implement and pay for the recommendations of Kirwan Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education, which recommends increasing early childhood education, increasing teacher salaries, and assuring all students have high quality and diverse teachers and access to advanced courses.

Even though many of our members do not have children or grandchildren in the county public schools, we are all paying for the schools, and we all support educational equity. The candidate forum will help inform our vote.

The coronavirus has delayed our annual book sale until next year when hopefully customers will feel safe again to attend. However, we continue to collect, filter and sort books, assessing each before putting them into storage. We carefully evaluate each to determine its likelihood of selling and its value.

You may recall that at the front of the book-sale room we have a special section called "Better Books." These are the books that sell above the general price of \$3 or less. They include first editions, rare books, books with a high initial selling price, and books on narrow topics with a small print run. Sales of the better books make a valuable contribution to the overall profit of the book sale. We continually scan incoming books for suitability for this section. If you or a friend has poten-

tially valuable books, your donation of these to our sale would help raise our scholarship funds. Mention this as you chat with others about the book sale.

NEWS FROM THE DISTANCE: LOIS LIGGETT

We miss those friends who have moved away, so we are seeking the latest news from those we can reach. Here is a message from Lois Liggett. You will remember Lois particularly for instigating the gigantic jump in available books that made our book sale the marvel that it is. In 2012, after serving as branch president, she and her husband, Walt, moved to their dream home in Montpelier, Vermont. Here is what she has to say.

Since January 2020 Walt and I finally understand the meaning of retirement. No volunteering. In the past eight years we have served on boards of directors for two nonprofits, sponsored mental health courses, chaired missions task force for church, and managed a Montpelier food pantry garden producing 500 pounds of veggies a year. Now our mission is limited to family affairs, gardening, and supporting a nonprofit that sponsors asylum seekers. The Sudanese fellow (a former refugee) we mentored for the last two years has done well. He is a U.S. citizen and owns a business in Montpelier. Occasionally he comes over and cooks us a Sudanese meal. I'll never forget the first time he did this about two years ago. He brought all the food and took over my kitchen.

Why the change in our activity level? Age and health decline for both of us. I have had lung cancer return after ten years and am being successfully treated with immunotherapy. Walt has Parkinson's, so he has slowed down.

On the bright side, we are still very functional. We have two gardens, one in our back yard and one at a community garden. We grow about thirty different fruits and berries and veggies, including mushrooms and chestnuts. This was a very good year for shitake mushrooms! We gave away lots of mushrooms to friends and neighbors. Some of them are now interested in growing their own, so we gave them tutorials.

In October we venture away from Vermont to travel by car to Kentucky for a week to attend a grandson's wedding. The wedding was postponed once because of covid.

I enjoyed the September meeting featuring the art appraiser. I will see you on future Zoom AAUW branch meetings.
