Let's all give another celebratory cheer for the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage, uniquely realized this year as we are voting in record numbers while staying safe. Please join members and friends for a post-election social hour Friday, November 6, on Zoom, starting at 4:30 pm. There is no set agenda, just a chance to catch up with friends and acquaintances that you have not seen for a while.

Now that most of us have passed the vote milestone, we can look forward to disputes about the census and redistributing the 438 House seats among the states. That makes our November program on the 2020 census especially timely. Our speaker will help us understand the intricacies of the count.

Aside from the political confusion, the coronavirus is probably everyone's main concern, and as the days get shorter and colder, we expect increasing numbers of Covid-19 infections and possible additional safety measures that restrict our interactions with family and friends. If you feel that you or your family members mental health has been negatively impacted by coronavirus vou are not alone. Residential communities such as Asbury are offering pandemicappropriate social and fitness options, and smartphone and computer apps offer meditation and calming music. This is really not enough.

Many of us in the branch want to find ways beyond Zoom meetings to involve our members

and communicate with them while in-person gatherings are restricted. We especially hope that we can establish new interactions with members who are socially isolated and perhaps are feeling anxious and stressed. Several branch officers have joined members of the other 12 branches in a new Maryland AAUW task force called Care to Connect. This effort was initiated by Erin Prangley, the state president. The task force plans to survey state members and branches to identify who is at risk for social isolation and loneliness, and work across branches to develop a plan to create support networks and address the constraints of the digital divide. The first monthly task force meeting is planned for October 26. If you have suggestions or want to participate please contact me.

Last but not least, you may not know that Anita Taylor, long-time branch member and dedicated leader of HerStory, is moving back to her home state of Kansas. As another Kansas native, I can testify that it is a gorgeous place, where the view over the prairies to the horizon is not obstructed by trees, and you won't get lost driving to someone's house. SAYING GOODBYE TO ANITA

Kansas! Anita Taylor is going back! Though Kansan politics might have strained her sensibilities, it is to Kansas she now returns--to her family and her land.

Anita joined AAUW twenty years ago. When she came to the Gaithersburg Branch, she became a preeminent leader, characterized by kindness, tolerance, and enlightenment. A scholar of women's studies, she organized and led the Herstory Interest Group. She also served as vice president for program, treasurer, and assistant treasurer of the book sale, as well as taking on those ad hoc duties that are the backbone of our branch. She lived at Asbury Village. There, she was one of the organizers of the Wildlife Council, dedicated to protecting and enhancing the flora and fauna of the Asbury campus, an endeavor which led to the designation of the Asbury campus as a Certified Wildlife Habitat. She frequently appeared on the Asbury

TV station explaining and pointing out the natural aspects of the campus grounds.



Anita is a professor emerita of George Mason University where she ended a 45-year university career, teach-

ing and doing research in communications and women's studies, as well as being involved in university administration. She had earned a Ph.D. in public address and history at the University of Missouri. She went on to become, along with her university duties, a writer, speaker, and workshop leader in communications and women's studies, achieving many awards for her work along the way.

She now majors in computer science and expects to finish her associate's degree at Montgomery College this summer before transferring to the University of Maryland or Johns Hopkins. Ami emigrated from Senegal in West Africa four years ago. Her goal is to become a data scientist or software engineer, although she has also considered joining the Air Force or attending medical school.

Katie Garcia attends the University of Maryland, College Park, at the Shady Grove campus. She is majoring in biolgical sciences, with a specialty in physiology and neurobiology. Katie expects to graduate in spring 2021, then take some months to prepare for the Medical Admissions Test. She is hoping to be accepted at Johns Hopkins Medical school to prepare for a career as a neurologist.



Elizabeth Argaw is pursuing a career as a dentist. A senior at the University of Maryland, College Park, she is attending the Shady Grove campus, expecting to graduate in May 2021.
