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## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fall is officially here and the leaves are turning colors, though a little late. We can also celebrate the availability of covid-19 vaccine for children as young as five years, making schools safer.

The branch hasn't met in person for over a year, restricting our personal conversations. And the book sale remains on hold until covid-19 guidelines again allow crowded rooms of people and books. Board members would love to hear your ideas for branch programs and alternative ways to handle the book sale. #### **AAUW STEM Program Is Growing**

AAUW programs supporting women and girls in STEM, Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, are growing with the recent selection of Dr. Leshell Hatley as its (first) director of STEM programs. Dr. Hatley has degrees in computer science and learning technologies, and has worked for many years developing and using technology and animation to help young people learn.

Jobs in STEM fields are some of the fastest growing and highest paying of the future. Yet girls and women are still not on a par with boys and men in these fields. Women make up only 28% of today's STEM workforce.

Past AAUW studies documented the difficult path for women and girls in STEM. These included "Solving the Equation, The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing" (2015); "Why So Few Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics" (2010); and "How Schools Shortchange Girls" (1995). AAUW recognizes that new data and analysis are needed to attack this persistent issue. In her talk at the AAUW of Maryland fall meeting, Dr. Hatley pointed out that AAUW is conducting research for new reports.

In addition, AAUW plans to survey branches about what they have done and are doing to en-

courage women and girls to pursue and continue STEM careers. Scour your memories and dig through your files for past STEM projects. A modest effort that I remember is the Montgomery County Interbranch awards ceremony for "Outstanding Promise and Achievements in Mathematics, Science, or Computer Science for Eighth-Grade Girls" conducted for several years in the mid-2000s in conjunction with Rockville Science Day at Montgomery College. I am sure that you remember other programs. While we wait for national AAUW to organize their effort, please share your recollections with me (edieallison[at]comcast[dot]net) and we will highlight some of them in future newsletters.

#### **Legislation I Have Been Watching**

Both Maryland and the federal government are considering legislation that impacts women's economic security. President Biden's legislative initiation, Build Back Better, is now being debated, and the Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women, which will meet virtually on November 13, will discuss planned bills that it will support for the 2022 Maryland legislative session. Expanded funding for home health care providers is being considered in both programs. In 2022 the Maryland legislature is likely to reintroduce the bill that failed in 2021 that would expand funding for home health care providers. Possible federal legislation would create a tax credit for caring for disabled persons of any age; family members, primarily women, who are the major care givers, would be eligible for this benefit.

Seven of the students who are receiving AAUW Gaithersburg Branch scholarships this year spoke at our October branch meeting. They told us about what the scholarships mean to them and how much they appreciate our work in raising funds for them.

Six of the students go to Montgomery College and one goes to the Universities at Shady Grove. Their majors include engineering, math, computer science, biology, biochemistry and neurobiology. Their career goals include being an electrical engineer, physician's assistant, environmental engineer, and in cyber security. Most of them participate in extracurricular activities such as Engineers Without Borders, the Rockville Campus Student Senate, Toastmasters Club, the student newspaper and Autistic Learning Partners. All of them seem to have part-time jobs, sometimes working 30 hours or more each week.

The covid epidemic brought them added challenges. Some family members contracted covid, while most had family members whose income was reduced due to job loss. This made their scholarships even more important this year, allowing them to persevere with

their studies and to hold on to their dreams of a better future.

These scholarship recipients showed us what a committed group of young women they are. All AAUW Gaithersburg Branch members should be proud to support them in their journey toward nontraditional careers. They will be wonderful role models for students who follow them. We were inspired by their stories, and we salute them. A representative of the Montgomery College Foundation was at the meeting and especially thanked us for our continued scholarship donations these past two years when many other organizations eliminated theirs

Although our branch has been unable to hold a book sale for the past two years, we have sold some special books, and branch members responded generously when asked for scholarship donations. We hope to resume the book sale next spring. We continue to collect books, CDs and DVDs.

## HERSTORY SNAPSHOTS

#### **Amelia Earhart Was a Feminist!**

We all know Amelia Earhart as the pioneering aviator who was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean, the first person to fly solo across the Pacific (from Hawaii to the U.S. mainland), and who died trying to be the first woman to fly around the globe. She was idolized as an American hero, but little publicity was made of her life-long interest in empowering women.

At first, as a girl, she kept a scrapbook on successful women in predominantly male-oriented fields. Later, she had a job as aviation editor for Cosmopolitan magazine, using that job to encourage women to enter aviation and to advocate for parity for women in aviation. She was also a founding member of the Ninety-Nines, an international organization of women pilots whose mission was to advance the cause of women in aviation. She played a leading role in this organization and served a term as its president. She was a member of the National Woman's Party and an early supporter of the Equal Rights Amend-

She viewed her marriage with pubisher G. P. Putnam as a partnership with

equal responsibilities for wife and husband, and pointedly kept her own name. Upon her marriage, she wrote to her husband, "I may have to keep some place where I can go to be by myself, now and then, for I cannot guarantee to endure at all times the confinement of even an attractive cage."

Responding to the laurels heaped on her after her trans-Atlantic flight, she commented, "I shall be happy if my small exploit has drawn attention to the fact that women, too, are flying."

#### **After Word**

There was another woman you should now about who was a pioneer aviator. Beryl Markham was an Englishwoman who lived most of her life in Kenya. She took off from London on a flight that was hazardous because it was against prevailing winds. Off course due to a storm, and running out of fuel, she landed in a bog in Nova Scotia. She was the first person to fly solo across the Atlantic from west to east.
