Civil rights icon Thurgood Marshall delivered an early blow to school segrega- tion right here in Montgomery County—gaining equal pay for the county's African American teachers in 1937. This little-known legal case is considered the first step in Marshall's successful drive to have separate schools for white and Black children declared unconstitutional, as the Supreme Court did 17 years later in a landmark decision. Presidents Message

Fall is here and the branch has enjoyed two successful 50th anniversary celebrations, the September 18 celebratory luncheon and the AAUW-Maryland Fall Meeting, which the branch hosted on October 15. The meeting welcomed AAUW members from around the state with the help of a large group of branch members.

A big round of applause to everyone who helped!

The Fall AAUW-Maryland program focused on topics appropriate to the period leading up to the November 8 Gubernatorial Election, improving voter participation for younger citizens. The voting rate for citizens over 65 years of age is over 70 percent, but under 50 percent for citizens under 30 years of age. Another feature of low levels of civic involvement by younger citizens, is the low level of young election workers. In the US most poll workers are over 60 years of age, and many are over 70.

Montgomery College is implementing a multipronged approach to increase voting by students, who have a high rate of voter registration but low election turnout. The college is supplying resources to help teachers incorporate voting affirmation into their curriculums. You may find some of the suggested data helpful in talking about civic involvement with your younger family members: the National Study of Learning, Voting and Engagement (NSLVE) at Tuffs University is a useful source of data, and best practices have been developed by the League of Women Voters.

Montgomery County Board of Elections has another tool that has successfully increased younger voter involvement. Future Vote gives middle and high school students SSL, Student Service Learning, credits for aiding at elections. This hands-on (students do not touch ballots or voting equipment) experience has helped boost the number of young people who are working as election judges, significantly lowering the average of county election judges.



Artists for ERA

AAUW Maryland President, Tracy Lantz, announced a new initiative for state branches and members, Vote Equality, a national campaign to get the Equal Rights Amendment ratified. AAUW Maryland will be involved through an Artists4ERA event at the Baltimore County Arts Guild, Catonsville, Maryland during the week of February 27 through March 5, 2023. The celebration will include a March 3 reception including a silent auction of the artwork and two panel discussions including local women on issues related to gender and equality on March 3. This event will be co-sponsored by the Anne Arundel, Baltimore, and Howard County branches as well as the Catonsville Dismantling Racism Committee and the Maryland Women's Heritage Center. Please plan to attend!!

I wish you and your family and friends a festive Thanksgiving. But before gathering for turkey and other traditional foods, join us for the November Zoom program on November 15. Ralph Buglass, author and researcher on Montgomery County history, will talk to us about Thurgood Marshall, the first African American Supreme Court justice, and his 1937 campaign in Montgomery County to gain equal pay for African American teachers.


