Happy New Year AAUW Gaithersburg

We can celebrate that Montgomery County women are joining the upper levels of the new state government. Maryland not only welcomed Governor Wes Moore, who was sworn into office on January 18, but also Aruna Miller, Maryland's first South Asian women to be elected Lieutenant Governor. Ms Miller previously represented Montgomery County in the House of Delegates. She is also a powerful, visible role model for women in STEM, having earned a BS degree in civil engineering from Missouri University of Science and Technology. Another woman who is well known to us, Senator Susan Lee, is expected to become the Maryland Secretary of State in the Moore Administration. In another first the Montgomery County Council will be majority female for the first time in history. The council will also be adding Latina, Asian and Black representatives, better representing the diversity of the county.

Another step toward gender equality is buried in the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 that became federal law on December 29, 2022, the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act. This law clarifies that it is unlawful to discriminate against pregnant workers by forcing them out of their jobs unnecessarily or by denying them reasonable accommodations, such as more frequent bathroom breaks. The legislation was introduced in February 2021 and passed the House in September 2021 but was unable to pass the Senate until it was added to the Consolidated Appropriation Bill. This legislation, which was required to keep the Federal government operating through September 2023, is often a convenient vehicle for popular bills that failed to attract enough attention to receive a separate vote.

There have been other laws aimed at preventing discrimination against pregnant workers. The Pregnancy Discrimination Act of 1978 generally ended the practice



of companies finding pregnancy itself a basis for termination. This new bill clarifies the types and scope of accommodations employers are required to provide to allow women to protect their health and work to provide for their families. AAUW was one of 220 organizations that endorsed and advocated for the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act.

Another important women's protection has been languishing since the 1970s, the Equal Rights Amendment. I have mentioned before that in 2023 AAUW Maryland's support for legal acceptance of ratification includes sponsoring an art event with Artists4ERA. Expect more details in the next several weeks.

I remember the campaign against Equal Rights warned of such horrors as unisex bathrooms and the military draft being extended to women. These topics are no longer particularly terrifying as women can hold most military positions and many bathrooms are open to anyone. However, American women continue to need legal support to achieve equality. News reports about the recent Supreme Court abortion decision highlighted the fact that women are not mentioned anywhere in the U.S. Constitution, meaning that any legal protection for women must be separately tested in the courts. The ERA amendment would correct this.

- The statewide organization allows us to organize collaborative events of importance such as the Artist4ERA exhibit.

For me, Maryland AAUW is also important for the connections I've made with wise women and men - from across the state, many of whom have become friends over the years, and the ability to maintain these friendships through being a member of AAUW Maryland. Time and again, I've gone back to these colleagues to ask for advice, to hear their perspectives on important issues, and to educate myself about the policies and legislation that affect women and girls in our state. LETTERS FROM BRANCH SCHOLARSHIP STUDENTS

The Gaithersburg branch funded scholarships for several disadvantaged women students at Montgomery College in 2022. We are sharing letters from three students telling of their challenges and accomplishments: Barbara Canales, Thy Nguyen, and Andrea Gaspare.

Dear AAUW- Gaithersburg

My name is Barbara Canales, and I am the recipient of the AAUW Gaithersburg Scholarship for this year. I want to express how appreciative I am in the work that you do in making scholarships like this possible for students who are pursuing a higher education. As a first-generation student, I tend to have moments where I feel that I am not capable of solely focusing on my studies. I sometimes feel like I should put a pause on my education and help my parents with bills by working a full-time job. These types of thoughts cause me to stay up thinking of ways how to balance my work, school and my social life while also helping my parents in any way that they need. While that may be all overwhelming, the AAUW scholarship can help me by paying for a textbook or a code for class. The scholarship could also be used for paying for a class that may help me to get a certificate that can help my family financially.

I have a year left until I finish my associate degree in Biology at Montgomery College. For the past year, I have challenged myself by stepping out of my comfort zone. I've presented at the Maryland Collegiate STEM Conference in April 2022 where I measured the amount of species richness and abundance at Burnt Mills Special Park. I had the opportunity of working with Professor Kiersten Newtoff who worked with me to be more comfortable with public speaking. As the Secretary of the Rockville Student Senate, I have advocated for funding for the new building at the Takoma Park campus and I have advocated for more general funding to go to Montgomery College, so that renovations like the one happening in the Takoma Park campus are possible.

Going to Montgomery College is one of the best decisions I've made because it was one of the

most important steppingstones in my journey of becoming a Physician Assistant. In high school, if you told me that I would present at a STEM conference, I wouldn't believe you. However, the faculty and professors at Montgomery College cheer for you along the way and moments like this are only possible through your contributions that allow me to spend more of my time in extracurricular activities gaining experience that helps me as a student pursuing medicine.
