BOOK SALE REPORT

The branch's 2024 book sale was a wonderful success. Book dealers and shoppers came by the dozens with happy faces and left with bags or boxes of their chosen reading materials. The Asbury Residents were particularly appreciative of the return of the book sale after five years, as many are not able to go out to other bookstores. We raised a good amount of money for scholarships at Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove. The final amount will be determined after all of our expenses are tallied. A number of families unable to afford books for their children were given bags of books for their families to enjoy. After the sale was completed, four local non-profit organizations took about 70 boxes of unsold books to use with their programs.

About one hundred volunteers who were not members of our branch helped with set-up, sorting, customer service, and clean-up. These included about 75 students, as well as Asbury residents and members of other AAUW Branches. We owe them our deep appreciation as our branch has fewer members and many are unable to assist in moving heavy boxes.

Thanks to all of our members and other volunteers who helped. For the first time this year we accepted credit cards, a successful way to increase sales. Edie Allison spearheaded this and was assisted by Linda Pickle, Averill Farrelly, and Jim Pearson. Maria Roberts did an excellent job at being sure all volunteers signed in



daily, and she managed all of the paperwork required for the over 75 middle and high school students who earn Student Service Learning Hours as they assist us. Barbara Garrard and Edie Allison quietly managed sale deposits and financial accounting during the sale. Other members who helped included Barbara Brooks, Carolyn Fisher, Anna Fraker, Pat John-son, Carol Plummer, Heather Reichardt, Ron-nie Roberts, Elizabeth Schwartz, Judy Sholes, Alice Wong, Mary Wykes. NEWS ABOUT DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION (DEI) to PERSUE

AAUW-Maryland DEI Virtual Town Hall

On March 11, 2024, the DEI Committee hosted a town hall to better understand the DEI interests and resources needed and to discuss advancing diversity and inclusion in the Branch's activities. The agenda included a brief review of AAUW's commitment to DEI, a review of the DEI definitions, highlights of current DEI activities in the Garrett County branch, and a group discussion. The AAUW Gaithersburg Branch was wellrepresented.

DEI in Baltimore County

Sevetra Peoples-Brown, Chief DEI Officer, and her division received an equity assessment from the Baltimore County Council to establish a baseline on how the county is doing and where it can improve equitable decision making. The contract also will assist in developing a DEI strategic plan and training staff based on those findings.

DEI in Higher Education

The Ash Center for Democratic Governance and Innovation's Institutional Antiracism and Accountability (IARA) Project founded and led by Professor Khalil Gibran Muhammad (Harvard University) and the Journalist's Resource cohosted a webinar titled "DEI in Higher Education: Five Truths and Five Myths" on March 28, 2024. The speakers explored practical tips for strengthening news coverage on the past, present, and future of DEI in higher education.
